Application

Admission requirements: threeyear degree, master's degree

An incoming selection is foreseen consisting in the evaluation of the qualifications presented by the candidates and/or a motivational/cognitive interview to be carried out in front of a specific Commission appointed by the Course Director.

The courses have a limited number and their activation is subject to the achievement of the minimum number of students.

Applicants need to:

- Complete the application form;
- Upload the detailed academic and professional CV;
- Upload a copy of an ID document;
- Upload a copy of a complete transcript;
- Upload a motivation letter, explaining the reasons for attending this summer program.

*There is an early bird of 15% for those who apply by 28 February 2021

Tuition fees

Tuition fees for the Summer Program have been fixed at:

- I week including accommodation: 1800 €
- 1 week excluding accomodation: 1400 €
- 2 weeks including accommodation: 3500 €
- 2 weeks excluding accommodation: 2600 €
- 3 weeks including accommodation: 5000€
- I 3 weeks excluding accommodation: 3800 €

Partner universities and Luiss students will receive a 10% tuition fee reduction.
