

## The Politics of Peripheral Incorporation: Italy's Mezzogiorno and Turkey's Kurdistan

## Abstract

This paper analyses two historical experiences of regional subordinate integration into national polities: Italy's annexation of the 'Two Sicilies' in the 1860s and Turkey's integration of most Kurdish-majority areas in the 1920s. In both regions, after the initial revolts, the integration of the landed aristocracies into the national political system led to a crystallisation of their class structure and the widening of the development gap with the countries' centre. On the one hand, the two regions came to occupy a similarly subordinate position in their national economy, largely focused on agriculture and mining and, later on, supplying cheap labour to the industrialising core. On the other hand, the local ruling classes became an essential component of the social bloc in power and played a pivotal role in maintaining conservative parliamentary majorities. This paper analyses these two cases to develop the concept of peripheral incorporation theoretically, including its differences and similarities with the experiences of colonialism.

In his PhD thesis analysed the history of Kurdish nationalism focusing on the role of class politics in shaping the divergent trajectories of the Kurdish national movements in Iraq and Turkey and was based on extensive fieldwork in Iraqi Kurdistan and Europe. He teaches international relations of the Middle East and international political theory.
